2002 ICSA North American Women's College Sailing Championships May 29-31, 2002 University of Hawai'i, Manoa

Aloha-

Aloha and welcome to the 2002 North American Women's Championship, hosted by the University of Hawai'i at Manoa. This is the 36th edition of the North American Championship. In 1961, the New England Women's Intercollegiate Sailing Association (NEWISA) was formed when New England no longer permitted women to sail in varsity regattas. In 1967, NEWISA and her sister organization, the Middle Atlantic Association of Women's Sailors (MAAWS), organized the first women's national championship. Policies and procedures for the event were set at the ICSA Annual Meeting in 1970, and in 1978 the results of the Women's North Americans were first included in the scoring for the Leonard Fowle Trophy.

Women's Intercollegiate Dinghy Championship Awards

Gerald C. Miller Trophy

Gerald Miller was the coach at Boston University in the late 1960s and was one of the originators of the first women's national championship. The trophy is awarded to the winning team of the ICYRA North American Women's Dinghy Championship.

New England Women's Intercollegiate Sailing Association Trophy (NEWISA Tray)

The NEWISA Tray honors Nancy Kleckner, the first graduate secretary of NEWISA. The trophy was first presented in 1969, and is awarded to the second place team at the ICYRA North American Women's Dinghy Championship.

Ann Campbell Trophy

The Ann Campbell Trophy honors the long-time Graduate Secretary of MAISA, current Intersectional Coordinator of ICYRA and member of the ICYRA Hall of Fame. The trophy was first presented in 1993, and is awarded to the third place team in the ICYRA North American Women's Dinghy

2001 RESULTS

University of Hawai'i Wins 2001 ICSA Women's North American Championships!

The University of Hawai'i Rainbows finished the final day of the 2001 Inter-Collegiate Sailing Association North American Women's Championship in first place with 185 points. Dartmouth College placed second with 200 points, followed by St. Mary's College of Maryland with 206.

The University of Hawai'i was comfortable sailing in the strong winds that were prevalent throughout the regatta. Head Coach Andy Johnson attributed their success to "experience with [A-division skipper] Molly O'Bryan and youthful energy in the B-division with Marin Diskant and all of our crews." O'Bryan sailed with two different crews: sophomore Sarah Hitchcock and freshman Renee DeCurtis. The A-boat won their division with 78 points. The Rainbows' B-division had 107 points; fourth place in the division but good enough for the overall title. Diskant and junior crew Melody Torres sailed all races except one, where freshman Jennifer Warnock skippered, with DeCurtis crewing.

Defending champion Dartmouth College's 200-point total was good enough for second place overall. The A-division team of seniors Erin Maxwell and Leslie Sandberg had 103 points, tying for fourth in division. Dartmouth's B-division, consisting of junior skipper Jen Morgan and junior crew Esther Freeman had 97 points, placing third in B. Morgan was thankful for "having a deep team with great practices every day."

Finishing third overall was St. Mary's College of Maryland. The A-division team of sophomore skipper Ali Sharp and junior crew Mikaela King had 126 points, including one first-place finish. Freshman Melissa Deveney crewed for Sharp in five races. The Seahawks won the B-division with 80 points thanks to consistent performance from sophomore skipper Jamie Smith and freshman crew Jen Vandermoer.

The three-day event was co-hosted by Harvard University and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology on the Charles River in Cambridge, MA. Harvard representatives Mike O'Connor and Bern Noack, and MIT's Fran Charles and Mike Kalin organized the event. Winds throughout the regatta were shifty, ranging from 5-18 knots. For the first nine of eighteen races, the A-division sailed Johnson FJs, while the B-division sailed Parker Larks. After nine races, the divisions switched fleets.

The Honolulu Community College Marine Education and Training Center



Head sailing coach Andy Johnson dreamed of a sailing facility that was up to par with other nationally-ranked schools. Before the completion in 1995 of the Honolulu Community College Marine Education and Training Center, the Rainbows kept their equipment in an old storage container in a small area at the Waikiki Yacht Club. Johnson wanted more for the program.

Johnson's dream came true with the grand opening of the Honolulu Community College Marine Education and Training Center in July 1995.

In 1993, Johnson was asked to draw up a proposal of all the things he would include in a new facility. When he visited the new building a month before its completion, he was amazed and pleased to see everything he had proposed included in the final design.

The \$8.7 million facility has been touted as the best of its kind anywhere in the world. Covering eight acres, the center houses a complex of classrooms, work bays, laboratories, offices and a library. Outside, there is a 52-vehicle and boat trailer parking lot. To top everything off, the facility is filled with the latest in state-of-the-art equipment.

The main function of the new facility is to house University of Hawai'i-Honolulu Community College's two-year boat maintenance and repair program. This program gives students the skills to run a modern boat yard. They are taught to use cranes to lift boats out of the water and into work bays. From there, they study the vessel's electrical, mechanical and plumbing systems.

As an island-state, Hawai'i's maritime and water recreation industry is very important. This training center is vital for producing the skilled labor needed to maintain the industry.

Manager for the state's Honolulu Waterfront Project, Chris Chung, helped to plan the facility because he saw an immediate need for skilled labor which is not currently

available in Hawai'i.

The University of Hawai'i Campus Center Leisure Program moved its sailing and water safety programs to the new facility in July 1995. Johnson, who is also the leisure program's assistant director, stores his program's boats at the new building. The training center can accommodate six boats in dock and 15 others on the boat house racks. There are also secured rooms for equipment and sails.

Johnson said, in previous years, the sailing and water safety courses normally had about 150 people registered. Registration has nearly doubled with the opening of the new facility. The two, five-day courses are open to the public as well as UH students. After passing the two courses, students are certified and can come back to rent boats.

Honolulu Community College's Marine Education and Training Center Director, Bob Perkins, calls the Training Center "a state of the art facility, having the ability to train students in small vessel repair and fabrication utilizing the latest equipment and technology." He is also pleased with the steps taken to ensure environmental safety as well.

Walter C. Wood Trophy

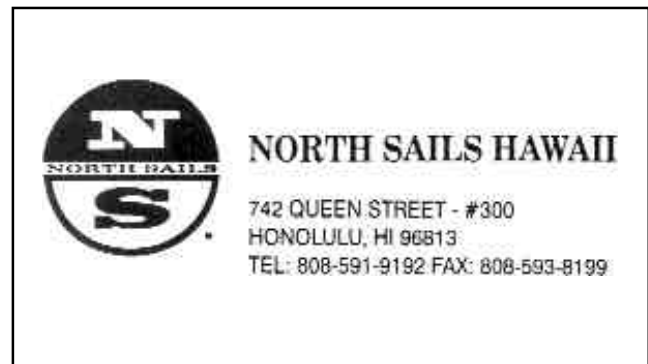
This trophy honors the outstanding contribution of Walter C. "Jack" Wood to intercollegiate sailing. Jack was MIT's first sailing director and, in conjunction with Leonard Fowle, was a founder of college racing. The trophy was donated by MIT graduates and Jack's friends, and is awarded to the winning team at the ICSA North American Team Racing Championships.

The first competitions for the Wood Trophy consisted of district All-Star teams that were principally made up from the colleges that had gathered for the Dinghy Championship. In 1977 a change was made so that each team in the championship was made up of individuals from only one

2001 RESULTS

Georgetown University Wins 2001 ICSA/Ronstan North American Team Racing Championships

At the conclusion of the third and final day of the 2001 Inter-Collegiate Sailing Association/Ronstan North American Team Racing Championships, Georgetown University emerged victorious with an 18 wins and 3 loss record. Harvard University placed second with a 16-5 record. Coming in third was Dartmouth College with 15 wins and 6 losses.

The three-day event was co-hosted by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Harvard University on the Charles River in Cambridge, MA. Winds throughout the regatta were puffy and shifty, providing a wide range of conditions to competitors. One complete round robin was sailed in Johnson Flying Juniors (FJs) and Parker Larks. After the 66 races were completed, the twelve teams were split into a six-team championship division and a six-team consolation division. The championship division sailed one of their mini-round robins in FJs, while the consolation division sailed theirs in Larks. In the team racing discipline, two teams each sail three boats at a time. The team with the better combined score at the finish is declared the winner. Due to the unique format of this event, 126 three-on-three matchups were completed. Each team sailed in 21 races.

WHAT IS TEAM RACING?

Team Racing, like most team sports, involves strategy, advanced skill, and teamwork. However, unlike other sports, team racing pits a team of three boats against another team of three. This added dimension forces players to have tremendous boat-handling ability and quick reactions. Being a good sailor is essential to becoming a team racer. A keen understanding of the rules, along with good speed and solid tactics, are necessary to be competitive in this sport. Those sailors who have not yet reached this level should strive to it. Team racing is the best place to test and improve your skills as a sailor.

Team racing is unique to sailing in that teamwork between boats on each team is essential. Teams have similar tactics and strategies to get their boats in to a winning combination. Some exciting maneuvers happen around the course in order for teams to accomplish this. It is quite interesting to watch teams working to execute their strategies. There are defensive and offensive maneuvers going on in most close races. The team that is able to best execute these strategies will most likely win the race.

The Team Racing for the ICSA/Ronstan North American Championships is being held in two person Flying Junior sailboats. The racing will take place close to shore for ideal spectating. In order for each team to be easily identifiable, they will have the same colored sails. The team who has the majority of their boats finish in front of the other teams boats is the winner of the race. Each of the twelve teams will get to race each other at least once. After three days of racing, which ever team has accumulated the best record will be awarded the Walter C. Wood Trophy for the 2002 ICSA/Ronstan Team Racing North American Championships.

Aloha and welcome to the 2002 North American Coed Dinghy Championships, sponsored by Gill North America, supported by Vanguard Sailboats and hosted by the University of Hawai'i at Manoa. This is the 66th edition of the ICOSA Coed Dinghy Championships. This event is the oldest of six North American Championships and by tradition and stature is considered "THE" North American Championship. The event rotates among the seven member districts. Each geographic area conducts district championships to qualify teams for North Americans. The number of berths per district is determined by the number of regular and provisional schools in each district. The Dinghy North Americans must be sailed in two-person dinghies, 11-15 feet in length. The Regatta format consists of two-division fleet racing, the most commonly used format in the ICOSA. The school with the

ICOSA North American Championship Awards

Henry A. Morss Memorial Trophy

The Henry A. Morss Memorial Trophy is awarded to the winning team in the ICOSA North American Coed Dinghy Championships. The trophy was donated by a group of nationally known yachtsmen as a memorial to Henry A. Morss, a Boston yachtsman and 1907 Bermuda Race winner, as well as an MIT alumnus and benefactor.

Oxford University Trophy

This trophy was presented by the Oxford University Yacht Club team and its captain Jeremy Thomas in 1954 on the occasion of the first of a continuing series of college regattas between British and North American teams held alternately in the United States and Great Britain every two years. The trophy is awarded to the second place team in the ICOSA North American Coed Dinghy Championships.

Metropolitan Sailing League Trophy

This trophy was presented in 1971 and is awarded to the third place team in the ICOSA North American Coed Dinghy Championships.

2001 RESULTS

Tufts University Wins 2001 ICSA North American Coed Dinghy Championships

Sponsored by Gill North America

After eighteen hard-fought races, the Tufts University won the 2001 ICSA North American Coed Dinghy Championships Sponsored by Gill North America by just two points. The Jumbos' 215-point total, representing an average finish of sixth-place, was closely followed by Harvard University with 217 and Dartmouth College, who had 220.

The three-day event was hosted by the University of Rhode Island at Wheeler Beach State Park in Narragansett, R.I. The championship was sponsored by Gill North America Ltd. and supported by Vanguard Sailboats (Portsmouth, R.I.), a partner in the ICSA Growth and Development Project. Vanguard Flying Juniors (FJs) were sailed in moderate sea breezes that persisted throughout the regatta.

Tufts last won the Coed Dinghy title in 1997, but "wasn't even supposed to be here," according to Coach Ken Legler. The Jumbos secured entry into the regatta through an at-large berth. Legler attributed his team's performance to "better boatspeed in steady air," conditions which weren't present at the New England qualifiers. Peter Levesque and Caroline Hall, both juniors, sailed together in the A-division for all but the final race, when senior Laurin Manning crewed for Levesque. With 100 points, Levesque, Hall and Manning won the A-division by a slim one-point margin. Deermount and Keith's 115 point total placed fifth in B-division, but was good enough for Tufts to win the overall title.

Harvard University, who placed second in the ICSA/Ronstan Team Racing Championships, also finished second in the Coed Dinghy Championship with 217 points. Junior skipper Sean Doyle sailed with sophomore crew Michelle Yu in the A-division for the first twelve races. On the final day, freshman Cardwell Potts sailed with Yu in races 13 through 16, and junior Laura Knoll in races 17 and 18. Harvard's 139 points in A-division placed the Crimson in sixth for that division. Juniors Margaret Gill and Susan Bonney dominated the B-division with just 78 points, 19 points ahead of the nearest competitor.

Dartmouth College's 220-point total was good for third place in the regatta. Senior Patrick Hogan and freshman Scott Hogan skippered in the A-division, while seniors Carly Prior and Katie Lyndon crewed. The Big Green placed fifth in the A-division with a 123-point total. With 70 points, seniors Erin Maxwell and Leslie Sandberg placed second in the B-division.
